Data Analysis at MLA


- ExpungeItMD data dashboard: as staff attorneys and pro bono volunteers complete expungement cases, data automatically generates on the dashboard
- Used for: funders, future grant applications, to judge efficacy of current efforts, decisions on where to place clinics



Race by Case







Data is used to inform Community Lawyering practice

- Initially, Maryland Legal Aid used publically accessible judiciary case search data to generate heat maps of zip codes with the highest number of charges eligible for expungement
- Clinics were placed in libraries, churches and community centers where zip codes revealed hundreds of thousands of eligible clients
- Now, data from the 28,000 petitions completed across the state continues to inform the process of selecting clinic locations, potential funders and partners



Outreach to potential clients in need

- Legal Aid staff place flyers door-to-door in neighborhoods
- Utilize trusted and valued community partners to carry your message, do the outreach for you
- Provide value for clients, and then empower clients to spread the word about services
- Be consistent
- Never hold a clinic just one time in one place, promise to return and always keep that promise
- Meet with partners for advice on working in each community, and listen to suggestions provided

Maryland Legal Aid Advancing Human Rights and Justice for All

Service Delivery to Remote Areas

- Determine ways by which rural communities congregate (ex: festivals, at firehalls, etc.), and advertise and hold clinics in those areas
- Libraries are a perfect location for partnerships: publically accessible even in remote areas, sources of information, trusted longtime community icons

Use of Innovative Technology to Provide Services

- It is essential to bring technology staff to the location of an outreach or clinic, to allow observation, feedback, understanding, and ideas for improvement
- Empower community lawyers to use technology efficiently, troubleshoot problems without tech professionals, and approach technology challenges with informed confidence
- When hiring staff, seek employees who feel comfortable being trained in advanced tech support at outreach clinics

Power of Partnerships

- At Maryland Legal Aid, since July 2015, there are now:
 - At least 250 new community partners
 - Over 150 new pro bono volunteers
 - 7 added attorney and paralegal positions in the Community Lawyering Initiative
 - 5 added attorney positions in Workforce Development
 - Lawyers in public libraries in 15 of 24 Maryland counties and Baltimore City
