The Legal Framework

Domestic Violence Act

The Domestic Violence Act provides legal protection for victims of domestic violence, focusing on the prevention and elimination of violence within families and intimate relationships.

Victims' Rights Act

This piece of legislation outlines the rights of victims throughout the criminal justice process, ensuring that they receive information and support at every stage.

Family Court Processes

The Family Court handles cases concerning protection orders and custody arrangements for children in cases of domestic violence and child abuse.

Support Services





Victim Support provides emotional support, information, and advocacy for victims of all types of crime, including domestic violence.




Women's Refuge

Women's Refuge provides a 24-hour crisis line, refuge accommodation, and support programmes for women and children experiencing domestic violence.



ACC

ACC provides financial compensation and rehabilitation support to victims of sexual assault, domestic violence, and other criminal offences.



Challenges and Gaps

1 Barriers to Reporting

Access to Justice

Victims of domestic violence may face fear, stigma, or cultural or language barriers when reporting abuse or seeking help. Some victims may struggle to navigate the legal system or face challenges in accessing legal aid or support services.

3 Limited Resources for Support Services

Support services may face funding or staffing shortages, making it challenging to meet the demand for their services.

Proposed Solutions and Reforms

Strengthening Legislation Reforms to domestic violence laws could include new offences or tougher Improving Access to Support penalties for perpetrators. Services Increased funding for support services and greater collaboration between 3 **Enhancing Collaboration** organisations could enhance the between Agencies accessibility and quality of services. Improved collaboration and information-sharing between police, health services, and support agencies could improve victim outcomes and

experiences.
