Selling or lending your bank account to others makes you an accomplice to fraud!



If your account is used by fraud groups, you could face up to 7 years of imprisonment and a fine of up to 5 million NTD, and your work permit in Taiwan could be revoked!



Never Share Your Social Media Accounts or Passwords with Anyone!

- All your social media or website accounts and passwords are important personal information — please never share them with family members, partners, or anyone else.
- Trust between couples should not be built on sharing passwords; many disputes occur after couples share accounts, especially during arguments or after breakups.
- Sharing accounts and passwords often disables two-factor authentication, increasing vulnerability to hackers.
- The best way to prevent these issues is to never share your account or password on any website or social platform.





Never Sign a Document if You Are Unsure About Its Content!

- Do not sign any document if you're unsure of its content—you have the right to understand it. Request documents in both languages when applicable.
- It's recommended to photograph any document you sign for your personal records.
- Even a symbol or handwritten note can be considered a signature and agreement to the content.
- Signing a document inevitably carries legal responsibilities and enforceable consequences.
- If you are coerced into signing, you may report it to the police or seek assistance through legal channels.





Beware of Shopping Scams!

- Prioritize buying physical goods in person; verify the seller's credibility when shopping online.
- Ensure the purchase amount is accurate when using convenience store pickup with payment. If there is any mistake, immediately cancel the pickup and withhold pay.
- Inspect the package under store surveillance when picking up and paying for goods.
 If any issues arise, inform staff to suspend payment.

Google Translate and other translation apps can be used to assist with communication.





Borrow Money or Loans Through Legal Channels!

- All loans are subject to repayment. Please utilize legitimate institutions for borrowing, as the value of collateral will determine the loan amount.
- Unscrupulous lenders may obtain your personal information or account details through illegal loans and misuse them. If criminal activities occur, you could be held liable and even face criminal charges.





Never Share Private Photos or Videos!

- Never share nude photos or sexual videos with anyone. Even if someone assures confidentiality, once shared, you face serious risks—such as blackmail, threats, doxxing, harassment, commercial exploitation, and other forms of ongoing abuse.
- Once intimate images are leaked, fully removing them from the internet is extremely dif-ficult and may result in long-term personal hardship and disruption.





If You Experience Sexual Violence, Be Brave and Seek Help!

- Many perpetrators of sexual violence are individuals you may know, and they often begin by testing your boundaries. If someone's actions make you uncomfortable, it is important to assertively speak up and stop them, or tell someone you trust.
- If you or someone you know experiences sexual violence, you may contact the 113 Protection Hotline for consultation (interpretation services available in English, Vietnamese, Indonesian, Thai, and Japanese). In cases of immediate danger, please call 110 for police assistance.





Do Not Trust Anyone Who Demands Upfront Payment for Access to Domestic or International Job Opportunities!

- Migrant workers in Taiwan may encounter brokers, fellow nationals, or others who
 claim: "Pay first, and I'll help you find a job or provide information about new
 employers." These job transfer channels offer minimal protection and may lead to
 scams.
- For better protection, use official, free channels such as the Ministry of Labor's job search website and local employment service stations.
